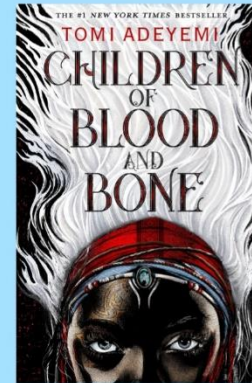

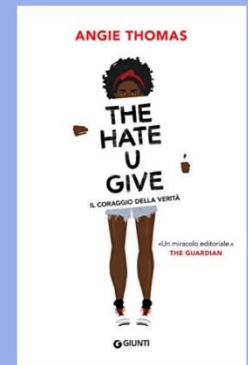


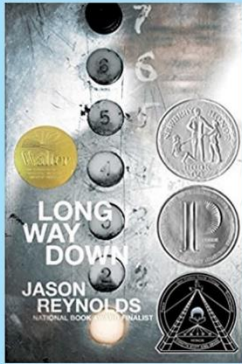
Children of Blood and Bone

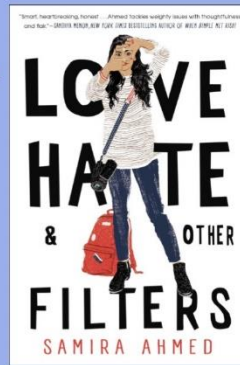


Long Way Down by Jason Reynolds

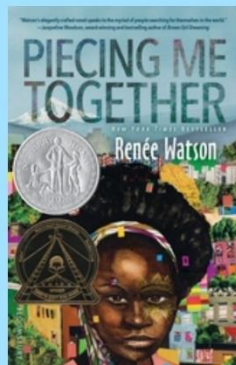
Love, Hate and Other Filters by Samira Ahmed

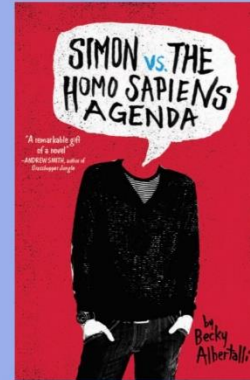
Piecing Me Together by Renee Watson
