SING: I Had a Shiny Dime

SING: Three Little Bills

SING: Down Around the Corner

Instructions: Fill in the blanks with any objects. For each verse, count down until you're left with none.

Down around the corner in the _____ shop Were five _____ with ____ on top Along came someone with a nickel to pay They bought a _____ and they took it away.

Object Examples:

Down around the corner in the bakery shop Were five little cookies with sprinkles on top...

Down around the corner in the neighborhood shop Were five umbrellas with points on top...

Down around the corner at my mom's pet store Were five little kittens and not one more...



SING: Pretty Flowers

Instructions: Hand your child a coin. Have them match their coin to the coin amount for each flower as you sing the rhyme.

Supplies: 2 pennies, 2 nickels, 2 dimes, 2 quarters, and four different flowers. One flower is worth a penny, one is worth a nickel, one is worth a dime, one is worth a quarter.

Song:

Pretty flowers in the flower store. Pretty flowers, who are they for? Along came [child's name] With a penny to pay. They bought one, Then gave it away.



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What is money?

- -Explain that it is used to trade with someone in return for a good or service (like buying ice cream, etc.)
- -Explain that when we "buy" something, we are trading the money for things (ice cream, toys, etc.)

Discussion: Explain how coins are different sizes, colors, and worth different amounts.

What happens when we spend money?

Explain that it is gone after we spend it.

What do we use money for? What else can we do with it besides spend it?

Explain that after you earn money you can spend it, save it, and/or give it.

Discussion: Why is it important to save money? What would you do with X-amount of dollars?

Set a family financial goal

Example: Plan to set aside the money you save for a celebration (big or small) like renting a movie, ordering food, buying a new toy, donating to a charity, etc.



WRITE: Coin Rubbing and Matching

Place a coin under a white sheet of paper. Using a colored pencil or crayon, gently rub the colored tip over the coin and paper until the coin design appears on the paper. Fill the sheet with different coin rubbings. Match the actual coin to the correct impression. Write the name of each coin and its value.



WRITE: Coin Identification Game

You and your child can trace around the outside of various coins and color in the shapes. Then invite your child to match the coin to the drawing while discussing each one's name.



PLAY: Coin Sorting

Coin Quantity: Group coins based on their coin type. Count the different amount of each coin type. For example, you may have 10 pennies, 3 nickels, 2 dimes, and 6 quarters.

- Which type of coins do you have the most of?
- Which type of coins do you have the least?
- How many coins do you have in total?

Coin Value: Next, count the total value of each of the coins. For example, if you have 10 pennies, you have 10 cents (\$0.10). If you have 10 nickels, you have fifty cents (\$0.50).

- Which coin type is worth the most?
- Which is worth the least?
- Does quantity (the total amount of each coins) or value (how much the coins are worth) matter more?
- What is the total value of your coins?

Dollar Combinations: Mix the coins together. See how many different ways you can create one dollar (\$1.00) using different coins.



PLAY: Play Store

Set up a play store with the items in this bag and whatever you have around your space. Look for the item prices on the "store name" sheet. Match the prices with your play money.



PLAY: Scavenger Hunt

Hide different values of play money around your space. You and your child can look for the money together. When you find some, name the coin/bill and write down the value.





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
