Apply to be appointed to the Genesee District Library Board of Trustees

The Genesee District Library is supported by an eight-member volunteer Board of Trustees. Four members are appointed by Grand Blanc Township officials and four are appointed by the Genesee County Board of Commissioners.

The role of the Board of Trustees is to approve policy, hire and conduct annual evaluations of the Director, approve budget and budget amendments, approve financial reports, represent and promote Genesee District Library in the community, serve on committees, approve the annual audit, and address all action items brought before the Board. The Board of Trustees meets every other month/6 times a year. Board members serve a four-year term.

Trustee Expectations/Preferred Qualifications

- Have strong belief in the Library as an integral institution in communities
- Be willing to advocate/promote on behalf of the Library
- Attend all meetings (both regular and special)
- Come to meetings prepared (reviewed Board packet)
- Answer email correspondence
- Be at least 18 years of age
- Previous Board experience
- History of community involvement
- Be a library cardholder

About Us

The Genesee District Library (GDL) is a 19-branch district library system formed in 1980 under the District Libraries Establishment Act 1989 PA 24 (MCL 937.171). GDL serves the residents of Genesee County, Michigan. Our legal service area covers all communities within the county with the exception of the City of Flint, which is served by the Flint Public Library.

The GDL was formed on January 1, 1980, through a partnership between Genesee County and Grand Blanc Township. It is governed by an eight-member volunteer board. Funding is provided through a .7481 county-wide millage (excluding the City of Flint). An additional 0.25 mills was approved on May 2, 2011. The last millage renewal was in August of 2016. The remaining revenue comes from fees and fines, state aid, grants, and gifts.

Over one million visits are made annually to the GDL for books, movies, music, technology, and programs. Residents within the service area also have online access to books and music.

Besides traditional library services, GDL has a full range of digital services, technology equipment, and programs for all ages.
